Council Member Loren Meagher is frustrated that Public Works is cutting down the trees that he had secured funding to do the work and the lack of communication that we are having with the committee meetings.

Attached is the proposed budget for the fiscal year 2024 for the City of Goldendale. This budget totals \$14.7 million, includes conservative revenue estimates and a 3% increase in expenditure. The budget also includes implementation of the utility rate study analysis. The budget, as presented, has been prepared in accordance with state regulations and the BARS accounting system. As was reported in the proposed preliminary budget, this proposed budget is balanced.

The Capital portion of the budget totals \$7.7 million and includes the following projects:

Overall, this budget maintains current levels of service and achieves several key investments to the community as shown above in the capital project list.

Water meter connection request outside of the service area will still require City Council authorization.

Council Member Loren Meagher does not want this ordinance because it will keep the council uninformed about the water connections. Loren wants this discussion to go back to the Public Works Committee.

There was discussion about the water service area versus water out of town service.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF GOLDENDALE AND KLICKITAT COUNTY FOR DISTRICT COURT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made this 12th day of December, 2023 by and between the CITY OF GOLDENDALE, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called "City" and KLICKITAT COUNTY, a political subdivision of the State of Washington, hereinafter called "County."

WHEREAS, the County has an established District Court System; and

WHEREAS, the City has been utilizing the services of East District Court for many years without an interlocal agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City has historically paid its pro rata share of the Judge's salary and benefits; and

WHEREAS, the County has requested that the pro rata share paid by the City is expanded to include the salary and benefits of the Judge and salaries and benefits of East District Court personnel; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Interlocal Agreement is to set for the terms of usage of East District Court by the City pursuant to RCW 39.34.180;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT AGREED by and between the parties as follows:

(1) East District Court Services. The County and its District Court shall furnish to the City the facilities and services of the East District Court for all cases wherein the City is the plaintiff in the East District Court, over which the East District Court has jurisdiction, for purposes of enforcing violation of state statutes or city ordinances committed by persons within the City's jurisdiction that constitute gross misdemeanors, misdemeanors, or civil infractions. Nothing in this Agreement shall permit the City to regulate the administration of the court.

(2) Compensation.

- (a) Calculation of Percentage of Usage. The parties have determined, and do hereby agree, that in return for facility usage and services of the District Court, the City shall pay the County, the City's pro rata share of the total costs of the salaries and benefits of the East District Court judge and courtroom personnel. The Washington State Caseload Reports will be the source for this utilization. The pro rata share shall be an amount equal to the ratio of the total number of violations filed wherein the City is the plaintiff, whether infractions or criminal violations, to the total number of (1) violations filed by all jurisdictions in East District Court, plus (2) felony complaints filed in East District Court, plus (3) small claims cases filed, plus (4) civil cases filed, plus (5) civil protection orders, plus (6) petitions for antiharassment orders, plus (7) parking infractions.
- (b) Costs to be Allocated by Percentage. The total costs allocated by paragraph (2)(a) above shall include, but are not limited to, and the salaries and benefits of the East District Court judge, salaries and benefits of the East District Court personnel for the adopted budget year, excluding (i) the costs of public defense for criminal defendants in East District Court; and (ii) the costs of housing of prisoners that are reflected in a separate budget line and in agreement with the Klickitat County Sheriff's Office.
- (c) <u>Time Period for Determining Percentage</u>. The ratio described above in paragraph (2) (a) shall for each year be based on the average case count for the previous 3 calendar years.
- (3) Billings. The County will invoice the City quarterly for the City's pro rata share of the agreed-upon figure for the calendar year. All sums due to the County shall be paid within thirty (30) days of mailing such invoice, via regular mail or electronic mail.

- (4) Distributions of Revenues to the City. All money received by the East District Court pursuant to court action in a case filed by the City, including penalties, fines, bail forfeitures, fees and costs, except as otherwise prohibited herein, shall be paid by the East District Court to the City; provided that the County may retain all money received as payments of assessments for probation costs ordered in the City's cases. The City shall not be entitled to any revenue received by East District Court other than revenues received pursuant to court action in a case filed by the City.
- (5) Term. This Agreement shall be effective upon execution by the parties and recording with the Klickitat County Auditor and shall remain in effect through December 31, 2025, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the terms of this Agreement or extended by written amendment. The Parties will negotiate the cost of East District Court Services every two (2) years. The County is responsible for sending a proposal to the City no later than February 15, 2025.
- (6) Termination and Notice of Termination. This Agreement is terminable by either party without cause if such party provides written notice of intent to terminate in accordance with RCW 3.50.810 and 35.20.010. Any such notice from the City must be received by the Chairperson of the Klickitat County Board of County Commissioners by the statutorily required date, and any such notice from the County must be received by the Mayor of the City by the statutorily required date.
- (7) Ownership of Property. All real and personal property used in the operation of East District Court has been and shall continue to be acquired by the County, owned by the County and may be disposed of at the discretion of the County.
- (8) Waiver of Binding Arbitration. Provided that this Agreement is not earlier terminated pursuant to the terms stated above, this Agreement will expire on December 31, 2025, unless a written renewal Agreement is executed prior to such date. The City and the County waive and release any right to invoke binding arbitration under RCW 3.62.070, 35.20.010, 39.34.180 or other applicable law as related to this Agreement, any extension or amendment of this Agreement, or any discussions or negotiations relating thereto.
- (9) Indemnification Regarding City Ordinances. The City agrees that the County does not assume any liability or responsibility for or release the City from any liability or responsibility which arises in whole or in part from the existence or effect of City ordinances, rules or regulations, policies or procedures as well as any and all cases filed by the Municipal Prosecutor and/or cited by members of City Police Departments. If any cause, claim, suit, action or administrative proceeding is commenced in which the enforceability and/or validity of any City ordinance, rule, regulation, policy or procedure is at issue or conduct or acts of Municipal Prosecutor and/or City Police Departments the City shall defend the same at its sole expense and if judgment is entered or damages are awarded against the City, the County, or both, the City shall satisfy the same, including all chargeable costs and attorney fees. This provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- (10) General Indemnification. The City and the County each agree to defend and indemnify the other and its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees and agents against all claims, losses, damages, suits, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, to the extent they arise out of, or result from, the negligence or willful misconduct of the indemnitor or its elected or appointed officials, officers, employees and agents in the performance of this Agreement. The indemnitor's duty to defend and indemnify extends to claims by the elected or appointed officials, officers, employees or agents of the indemnitor or of any contractor or subcontractor or indemnitor. The indemnitor waives its immunity under Title 51 of the Revised Code of Washington solely for the purpose of this provision and acknowledges that this waiver was mutually negotiated. This provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- (11) Captions. The paragraph and subsection captions used in this Agreement are for convenience only and shall not control or affect the meaning or construction of any provisions of this Agreement.
- (12) Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire Agreement and understanding of the parties with

respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior oral or written understandings, agreements, promises or other undertakings between the parties, including but not limited to the interlocal agreement executed by the parties in 2009 for District Court Services.

- (13) Governing Law. This Agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws and court rules of the State of Washington in effect on the date of execution of this Agreement. In the event any party deems it necessary to institute legal action or proceedings to ensure any right or obligation under this Agreement, the parties agree that such action shall be brought in a court of competent jurisdiction situated in Klickitat County, Washington.
- (14) No Third Party Rights. Except as expressly provided herein, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to permit anyone other than the parties hereto to rely upon the covenants and agreements herein contained nor to give any such third party a cause of action (as a third party beneficiary or otherwise) on account of any nonperformance hereunder.
- (15) Amendment or Waiver. This Agreement may not be modified or amended except by resolution or ordinance adopted by the City and the County. No course of dealing between the parties or any delay in exercising rights hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any rights of any party.



2024 LODGING TAX FUNDS GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS

The City of Goldendale has established the Event Committee to support tourism promotion projects within the City of Goldendale. The purpose is to provide funding to eligible organizations or groups for the purpose of positively impacting tourism in the City of Goldendale. Pursuant to RCW 67.28.1817, funding and specific awards are dependent on recommendations of the Event Committee and final decision by the City Council. The City Council may allocate all, none, or a portion of the available funds.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The lodging tax is an existing (sales tax) authorized by Washington State law in RCW 67.28, Public Stadium, Convention, Arts and Tourism Facilities. The City of Goldendale receives revenue from the Washington State Revenue Department under a special Hotel-Motel Tax. The tax is a charge placed on consumers for lodging at hotels, motels, rooming houses, private campgrounds, recreational vehicle parks, and similar facilities for continuous periods of less than one month.

Funding for this program comes from the City of Goldendale Tourism Fund which receives hotel/motel taxes from lodging establishments from inside the city limits. The city collects a four percent tax on charges for overnight lodging 2% is considered a basic hotel/motel tax and the second 2% is a credit against the sales tax that lodging establishments collect.

The City of Goldendale considers lodging tax funded proposals from public agencies and <u>non-profit</u> <u>organizations</u>. Proposals must completely address the questions in the application, and all requested supplemental information must be provided.

EVENT COMMITTEE ALLOCATION EVALUATION CRITERIA

The criteria listed below constitute the standards by which applications for funding from the Lodging Tax Fund are judged. In some cases, by their nature, some applicant events, activities, programs, organizations and facilities will not be able to meet all criteria. However, the more criteria met the stronger the application.

Community Economic Impact

Potential positive economic impact of tourism on the community is a significant benefit that can be measured. In its most fundamental effect, tourism impacts the community's economy through the dollars brought to and spent in the City of Goldendale. Overnight stays generate more revenue than day visits.

The total impact can be measured in terms of direct dollar expenditures made by the visitors themselves and indirect dollar expenditures made as the money moves through the community. In evaluating applications in this area, more weight will be given to direct expenditures as they are more readily measurable.

In assessing the probable economic impact of the proposal, the Committee will consider: (a) The estimated number of visits to be generated; (b) The estimated number of overnight stays to be generated; (c) The duration of the event, activity or program; (d) The event's generation of economic activity during off-peak tourism seasons or periods; (e) The use of local firms and resources in the proposed event, activity, program or facility; and (f) New or first time events or activities.

Resources Available for Event or Facility

The applicant should identify other community capital and/or labor sources to ensure project success. Each year applications submitted for funding proposal is not guaranteed for subsequent years.

Providing seed money that will help establish the activity, program, event, organization, or facility which will later function successfully on its own are preferred.

Builds on Identified Community Assets

Community assets include natural amenities, facilities, festivals, events and activities that distinguish the City of Goldendale in the region, state and nation. Those things both help constitute and promote the County's positive image.

Meets Community Objectives

Events, projects, activities, and facilities that also serve the broader community will be given preference. The Committee will assess whether the proposal furthers the success of and coordinates with scheduled community events, facilities, and community promotion and marketing efforts.

Meets the Requirements of the Lodging Tax Law RCW 67.28.080 & 67.28.1815

Information on the requirements can be found on the Washington State Legislature website at: http://apps.leg.wa.gov/rcw/_Committee will only consider proposals meeting statutory requirements.

ADDITIONAL GUIDELINES & REQUIREMENTS

Eligibility

Each applicant will concisely define the project or event to be pursued and demonstrate how it will do so. The project or event must be in compliance with Washington State statutes and the City of Goldendale guidelines established in this program.

Project Description and Scope of Work

The applicant will submit a scope of work that describes the project in detail.

Promotion Plan

If applicable, the proposal will include a detailed description of the plan to advertise, publicize and distribute information related to the project.

Schedule/Timeline

The scope of work will include a timeline indicating when each element will be undertaken and completed. Projects are expected to be completed during the funding year. It is within the City Council's discretion to revoke the funding if funds are not expended within the funding year without proper explanation.

Budget

The project will include both income and expense categories; all income (including in-kind) will be broken out by amount, source and eligible expenses will be itemized.

Insurance

As part of its contract for performance, the City requires contractors to maintain liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate coverage.

Where automobiles are used in conjunction with the performance of this agreement, throughout the life of this Agreement the Contractor and its Subcontractors shall, at their own expense, maintain automobile liability insurance with a carrier licensed to do business in the state of Washington and with minimum coverage as follows: Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability Insurance, \$1,000,000 each occurrence or combined single limit coverage of \$1,000,000.

General Liability insurance and, if applicable, automobile liability insurance coverage shall be provided under a comprehensive general and automotive liability form of insurance, such as is usual to the practice of the insurance industry, including, but not limited to all usual coverage referred to as Personal Injury including coverage A, B, and C. If applicable, automobile liability insurance shall include coverage for owned, non-owned, leased or hired vehicles.

The City of Goldendale shall be named as an additional insured on all policies except automobile insurance and all such insurance as is carried by the Contractor shall be primary over any insurance carried by the City of Goldendale. The Contractor shall provide a certificate of insurance.

Reimbursement

The City intends to enter into cost reimbursement contracts.

Reporting

When the project is complete, applicants will complete and return a *Final Event/Project Report* with original receipts and documentation for reimbursement. State law, under RCW 67.28.1816, requires that local jurisdictions receiving Lodging Tax revenues must submit an annual economic impact report.

Selection Process

After applications are submitted to the Event Committee, they will be reviewed and evaluated by committee members and staff for eligibility, quality of proposal, and consideration of the project/event. Applicants may be contacted to provide clarification, make corrections or supply additional information. Applications that do not meet the guidelines will be disqualified and returned.

Applicants may be requested to attend a meeting of the Event Committee or City Council. They will be notified of the date, time and meeting location.

- (1) "Acquisition" includes, but is not limited to, siting, acquisition, design, construction, refurbishing, expansion, repair, and improvement, including paying or securing the payment of all or any portion of general obligation bonds, leases, revenue bonds, or other obligations issued or incurred for such purpose or purposes under this chapter.
- (2) "Municipality" means any county, city or town of the state of Washington.

- (3) "Operation" includes, but is not limited to, operation, management, and marketing.
- (4) "Person" means the federal government or any agency thereof, the state or any agency, subdivision, taxing district or municipal corporations thereof other than county, city or town, any private corporation, partnership, association, or individual.
- (5) "Tourism" means economic activity resulting from tourists, which may include sales of overnight lodging, meals, tours, gifts, or souvenirs.
- (6) "Tourism promotion" means activities and expenditures designed to increase tourism, including but not limited to advertising, publicizing, or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting and welcoming tourists; developing strategies to expand tourism; operating tourism promotion agencies; and funding marketing of special events and festivals designed to attract tourists.
- (7) "Tourism-related facility" means real or tangible personal property with a usable life of three or more years, or constructed with volunteer labor, and used to support tourism, performing arts, or to accommodate tourist activities.
- (8) "Tourist" means a person who travels from a place of residence to a different town, city, county, state, or country, for purposes of business, pleasure, recreation, education, arts, heritage, or culture.







2024 LODGING TAX FUNDS GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS

The City of Goldendale has established the Event Committee to support tourism promotion projects within the City of Goldendale. The purpose is to provide funding to eligible organizations or groups for the purpose of positively impacting tourism in the City of Goldendale. Pursuant to RCW 67.28.1817, funding and specific awards are dependent on recommendations of the Event Committee and final decision by the City Council. The City Council may allocate all, none, or a portion of the available funds.

The Event Committee is accepting proposals for tourism related services to be provided during the 2024 calendar year and funded by revenue from the City's lodging tax. Lodging taxes available for 2024 are estimated to be \$50,000. Selected proposals will be based on their emphasis and ability to create events and activities that will result in positive user impacts on lodging, restaurants, and retail markets in the City of Goldendale.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The lodging tax is an existing (sales tax) authorized by Washington State law in RCW 67.28, Public Stadium, Convention, Arts and Tourism Facilities. The City of Goldendale receives revenue from the Washington State Revenue Department under a special Hotel-Motel Tax. The tax is a charge placed on consumers for lodging at hotels, motels, rooming houses, private campgrounds, recreational vehicle parks, and similar facilities for continuous periods of less than one month.

Funding for this program comes from the City of Goldendale Tourism Fund which receives hotel/motel taxes from lodging establishments from inside the city limits. The city collects a four percent tax on charges for overnight lodging 2% is considered a basic hotel/motel tax and the second 2% is a credit against the sales tax that lodging establishments collect.

The City of Goldendale considers lodging tax funded proposals from public agencies and <u>non-profit</u> <u>organizations</u>. Proposals must completely address the questions in the application, and all requested supplemental information must be provided.

EVENT COMMITTEE ALLOCATION EVALUATION CRITERIA

The criteria listed below constitute the standards by which applications for funding from the Lodging Tax Fund are judged. In some cases, by their nature, some applicant events, activities, programs, organizations and facilities will not be able to meet all criteria. However, the more criteria met the stronger the application.

Community Economic Impact

Potential positive economic impact of tourism on the community is a significant benefit that can be measured. In its most fundamental effect, tourism impacts the community's economy through the dollars brought to and spent in the City of Goldendale. Overnight stays generate more revenue than day visits.

The total impact can be measured in terms of direct dollar expenditures made by the visitors themselves and indirect dollar expenditures made as the money moves through the community. In evaluating applications in this area, more weight will be given to direct expenditures as they are more readily measurable.

In assessing the probable economic impact of the proposal, the Committee will consider: (a) The estimated number of visits to be generated; (b) The estimated number of overnight stays to be generated; (c) The duration of the event, activity or program; (d) The event's generation of economic activity during off-peak tourism seasons or periods; (e) The use of local firms and resources in the proposed event, activity, program or facility; and (f) New or first time events or activities.

Resources Available for Event or Facility

The applicant should identify other community capital and/or labor sources to ensure project success. Each year applications submitted for funding proposal is not guaranteed for subsequent

years. Providing seed money that will help establish the activity, program, event, organization, or facility which will later function successfully on its own are preferred.

Builds on Identified Community Assets

Community assets include natural amenities, facilities, festivals, events and activities that distinguish the City of Goldendale in the region, state and nation. Those things both help constitute and promote the County's positive image.

Meets Community Objectives

Events, projects, activities, and facilities that also serve the broader community will be given preference. The Committee will assess whether the proposal furthers the success of and coordinates with scheduled community events, facilities, and community promotion and marketing efforts.

Meets the Requirements of the Lodging Tax Law RCW 67.28.080 & 67.28.1815

Information on the requirements can be found on the Washington State Legislature website at: http://apps.leg.wa.gov/rcw/ Committee will only consider proposals meeting statutory requirements.

ADDITIONAL GUIDELINES & REQUIREMENTS

Eligibility

Each applicant will concisely define the project or event to be pursued and demonstrate how it will do so. The project or event must be in compliance with Washington State statutes and the City of Goldendale guidelines established in this program.

Project Description and Scope of Work

The applicant will submit a scope of work that describes the project in detail.

Promotion Plan

If applicable, the proposal will include a detailed description of the plan to advertise, publicize and distribute information related to the project.

Schedule/Timeline

The scope of work will include a timeline indicating when each element will be undertaken and completed. Projects are expected to be completed during the funding year. It is within the City Council's discretion to revoke the funding if funds are not expended within the funding year without proper explanation.

Budget

The project will include both income and expense categories; all income (including in-kind) will be broken out by amount, source and eligible expenses will be itemized.

Insurance

As part of its contract for performance, the City requires contractors to maintain liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate coverage.

Where automobiles are used in conjunction with the performance of this agreement, throughout the life of this Agreement the Contractor and its Subcontractors shall, at their own expense, maintain automobile liability insurance with a carrier licensed to do business in the state of Washington and with minimum coverage as follows: Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability Insurance, \$1,000,000 each occurrence or combined single limit coverage of \$1,000,000.

General Liability insurance and, if applicable, automobile liability insurance coverage shall be provided under a comprehensive general and automotive liability form of insurance, such as is usual to the practice of the insurance industry, including, but not limited to all usual coverage referred to as Personal Injury including coverage A, B, and C. If applicable, automobile liability insurance shall include coverage for owned, non-owned, leased or hired vehicles.

The City of Goldendale shall be named as an additional insured on all policies except automobile insurance and all such insurance as is carried by the Contractor shall be primary over any insurance carried by the City of Goldendale. The Contractor shall provide a certificate of insurance

Reimbursement

The City intends to enter into cost reimbursement contracts.

Reporting

When the project is complete, applicants will complete and return a *Final Event/Project Report* with original receipts and documentation for reimbursement. State law, under RCW 67.28.1816, requires that local jurisdictions receiving Lodging Tax revenues must submit an annual economic impact report.

Selection Process

After applications are submitted to the Event Committee, they will be reviewed and evaluated by committee members and staff for eligibility, quality of proposal, and consideration of the project/event. Applicants may be contacted to provide clarification, make corrections or supply additional information. Applications that do not meet the guidelines will be disqualified and returned.

Applicants may be requested to attend a meeting of the Event Committee or City Council. They will be notified of the date, time and meeting location.

Applicable Definitions from RCW 67.28.080

(1) "Acquisition" includes, but is not limited to, siting, acquisition, design, construction, refurbishing, expansion, repair, and improvement, including paying or securing the payment of all or

any portion of general obligation bonds, leases, revenue bonds, or other obligations issued or incurred for such purpose or purposes under this chapter.

- (2) "Municipality" means any county, city or town of the state of Washington.
- (3) "Operation" includes, but is not limited to, operation, management, and marketing.
- (4) "Person" means the federal government or any agency thereof, the state or any agency, subdivision, taxing district or municipal corporations thereof other than county, city or town, any private corporation, partnership, association, or individual.
- (5) "Tourism" means economic activity resulting from tourists, which may include sales of overnight lodging, meals, tours, gifts, or souvenirs.
- (6) "Tourism promotion" means activities and expenditures designed to increase tourism, including but not limited to advertising, publicizing, or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting and welcoming tourists; developing strategies to expand tourism; operating tourism promotion agencies; and funding marketing of special events and festivals designed to attract tourists.
- (7) "Tourism-related facility" means real or tangible personal property with a usable life of three or more years, or constructed with volunteer labor, and used to support tourism, performing arts, or to accommodate tourist activities.
- (8) "Tourist" means a person who travels from a place of residence to a different town, city, county, state, or country, for purposes of business, pleasure, recreation, education, arts, heritage, or culture.

The American Legion will be providing the opening ceremonies. Our 1st annual event was a success, brought in many attendees from out of the area & we received great community feedback. Community members that we spoke with encouraged us to continue on our quest to make this event a continuing effort.

SCOPE OF WORK

- (b) The expected event attendance;

The community will benefit with bringing in local food & wares vendors, along with the utilization of the Klickitat County Fairgrounds. We have previously brought in attendees from out of town, who undoubtedly utilized local restaurants, fuel stations, and lodging facilities.

Our estimated attendance for the 2023 event was 2,500 & we far exceeded that estimate, so this year we are anticipating upwards of 3,000 attendees.

For 2023, we utilized the local newspaper, along with local radio stations, social media pages, and printed advertisements for marketing & promoting the event. We anticipate using the same avenues, with assistance of the Goldendale Chamber of Commerce.

We utilized the Klickitat County Fairgrounds in 2023 from July 2nd to July 5th & we are forecasting our event to take the same amount of time for set up, the actual event, and clean up.

We are striving to continue this event year after year, carrying over profits from year to year in order to account for inflation of prices for supplies, entertainment, etc along with additional festivities during the event.

COMMUNITY ECONOMIC IMPACT

Articles of Incorporation

of

A B A T E of WASHINGTON

The undersigned person, acting as the incorporator of a corporation under the provisions of the Washington .

Nonprofit Corporation Act (Revised Code of Washington 24.03), adopt the following articles of incorporation for such corporation:

ARTICLE I.

The name of the corporation shall be ADATE OF WASHINGTON.

ARTICLE II.

The Period of duration of the corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE III.

The purposes and objects for which the corporation is organized are:

- (1) To promote motorcycle safety education programs, motorcycle awareness programs, and motorcycle rider training programs;

ARTICLE IV.

The address of the initial registered office of the corporation shall be 13059 S.W. 103rd Street, City

of Renton, County of King, Washington. The name of the initial registered agent of the corporation at such address shall be Jerry D.C. Westfall.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

The undersigned subscribers, a natural persons competent to contract, hereby files these Articles of Incorporation in order to form a corporation not for profit under the laws of the state of Washington.

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this Corporation shall be GOLDENDALE PRIDE ALLIANCE.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSES & POWERS

Section 1. Purposes.

The Corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, medical assistance, legal assistance, educational and community development purposes which support positive environment and treatment for people identifying as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer and/or Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, Two-Spirit, and the countless affirmative ways in which people choose to self-identify (LGBTQIA2S+), including, for such purposes, the donations to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations, within the meaning of § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (or the corresponding provision of any future federal tax code).

- (a) Without any order of priority, and with priority given to the people and entities of Klickitat County, to carry out its purposes the Corporation through its appointed Board of Directors (Directors) will:
- 1. Provide for events that create awareness of LGBTQIA2S+ and related issues.
- Provide assistance to address medical needs to include assistance with payment of medical bills, transportation and travel costs to places for medical treatment, to include without limitation the travel costs of the patient and a close relative(s) of the patient or burial and final expenses, as nominated by the Directors.
- Provide for training & technical assistance to healthcare facilities to enable their care of LGBTQIA2S+
 patients and access to healthcare.
- 4. Provide assistance to Klickitat County and incorporated governmental entities to encourage LGBTQIA2S+ economic development to include loans, so long as such assistance does not violate its § 501(c)(3) status. as nominated by the Directors.
- 5. Provide scholarships (tuition, books, essential equipment, living expenses, and transportation costs) and professional development to community residents as nominated by the Directors.
- 6. Provide assistance to school programs to encourage education, citizenship and leadership.
- 7. Provide assistance to other charitable organizations, funds, or persons doing charitable works, as nominated by the Directors.
- 8. Provide assistance for the acquisition and/or placement of art works, statues, and monuments, as nominated by the directors.
- 9. Provide assistance for basic personal needs including food, clothing, or shelter assistance, as nominated by the Directors.
- 10. Provide assistance supporting emergency response services, as nominated by the Directors.

Section 2. Powers.

- (a) The Corporation's purposes as herein stated shall be carried out by its Trustees and Board of Directors in a manner that will enable the Corporation to qualify as a charitable organization within the meaning of § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. To this end, the Corporation shall have the following powers:
 - (i) To own, acquire, convey, exchange, lease, mortgage, encumber transfer upon trust, or otherwise dispose of, all property, real or personal; to borrow money, contract debts, and issue bonds, notes and debentures, and to secure the payment or performance of its obligations.
 - (ii) To receive property by gift, devise, or bequest subject to the laws regulating the transfer of property by will, and otherwise to acquire and hold all property, real or personal, including shares of stock, bonds, and securities of other corporations.
 - (iii) To enter into contracts with any person, firm, association, corporation, municipality, county, state, nation or other body politic or with any colony, dependency or agency of any of the foregoing.
 - (iv) To perform every act necessary or proper for the accomplishment of the objects and purposes enumerated or for the protection and benefit of the Corporation.
 - (b) Notwithstanding any powers granted to this Corporation by its charter, bylaws, or by the laws of the state of Washington, the following limitations of powers shall apply and be paramount:
 - (i) No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member, director, officer of the Corporation, or any private individual (except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the Corporation affecting one or more of its purposes, and except to the extent that benefit inures to persons in accordance with the carrying out of the Corporation's charitable purposes as herein defined), and no member, director, officer of the Corporation, or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the Corporate assets on dissolution of the Corporation.
 - (ii) No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the public advocation of a bill or ordinance, code or otherwise attempting, to influence legislation.
 - (iii) The Corporation shall not participate in or intervene in (including the publication or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of (or in opposition to) any candidate for public office.
- (iv) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this certificate, the Corporation shall not conduct or carry on any activities not permitted to be conducted or carried on by an organization exempt under § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or by an organization, contributions to which are deductible under § 170(c)(2) or 2055(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- (v) Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Trustees of the corporation shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Corporation, distribute all residual assets of the Corporation to one or more organizations which themselves are exempt as organizations described in §§ 501(c)(3) and 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code or corresponding sections of any prior or future Internal Revenue Code or to the federal, state, or local government for exclusive public purpose. Any assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by a court of competent jurisdiction exclusively for charitable purposes, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for such charitable purposes, as the court shall determine.

ARTICLEIII.

If the Corporation is a Private Foundation within the meaning of § 509 of the Internal Revenue Code, and is not an Operating Foundation as defined by I.R.C. § 4942, then the provisions of this Article III shall apply.

- (a) The corporation shall distribute its income for each tax year at such time and in such manner as not to become subject to the tax on undistributed income imposed by I.R.C. § 4942, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.
- (b) The corporation shall not engage in any act of self-dealing as defined in I.R.C. § 4941(d), or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.
- (c) The corporation shall not retain any excess business holdings as defined in I.R.C. § 4943(c), or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.
- (d) The corporation shall not make any investments in such manner as to subject it to tax under I.R.C. § 4944, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.
- (e) The corporation shall not make any taxable expenditures as defined in I.R.C. § 4945(d), or corresponding provisions of any subsequent federal tax laws.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERS

There are two classes of members of the Corporation:

- (a) Trustees which shall be comprised initially of Kent Apostol, Andrew Halm, Skylar Newkirk, Kurt Ross, Joshua Van Horn. In the event and Trustee resigns, the remaining Trustees may select a replacement Trustee to take departing Trustee's position on the Board.
- (1) The Trustees shall have the sole power to appoint or remove by majority vote the Corporation's Directors.
- (2) The Trustees shall have the sole power to terminate the corporation, provided such determination is done in accordance with applicable laws and these Articles and the Corporation's Bylaws.
- (b) Community Board of Directors to be comprised of 5 positions. Directors shall be admitted to the membership of the Corporation upon taking office as a Director.
 - (1) The Directors are charged with appointing from their number the officers described further herein.
- (2) The Directors are charged with selecting all recipients of Corporate grants and disbursements and making the determination of amounts to be disbursed by the Corporation in conformity with the Corporate purposes.
- (3) The Directors are charged with the day to day operations of the Corporation and making all reports legally required to be made by the Corporation.
- (4) The Directors may designate among themselves separate responsibilities needed to best accomplish the corporate purposes.

-

(5) The Directors can only act by majority vote.

ARTICLE V. TERM OF CORPORATE EXISTENCE

This Corporation shall exist perpetually unless dissolved according to law.

ARTICLE VI. REGISTERED OFFICE AND AGENT

 - (i) Whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative, other than one by or in the right of the Corporation to procure a judgment in its favor, brought to impose a liability or penalty on such person for an act alleged to have been committed by such person in his or her capacity of Director or officer of the Corporation, against judgments, fines, amounts paid in settlement and reasonable expenses, including attorney's fees, actually and necessarily incurred as a result of such action, suit or proceeding or any appeal therein, if such person acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that such action was in the best interests of the Corporation and without reasonable ground for belief that such action was unlawful.
 - (ii) Such indemnified party must agree in writing to refund any expense incurred by the Corporation if it is proven that the indemnified party acted illegally without the well-founded opinion that its actions were legal and in the best interest of the Corporation.
 - (b) The Trustees shall have the sole discretion to determine whether amounts for which a Director seeks indemnification were properly incurred and whether such Director acted in good faith and in a manner such Director reasonably believed to be in the best interests of the Corporation, and whether, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, such Director had no reasonable ground for belief that such action was unlawful. Such determination shall be made by the Trustees by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of Trustees who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding.
 - (c) The foregoing rights of indemnification shall not be deemed to limit in any way the powers of the Corporation to indemnify under applicable law.





2024 LODGING TAX FUNDS GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS

The City of Goldendale has established the Event Committee to support tourism promotion projects within the City of Goldendale. The purpose is to provide funding to eligible organizations or groups for the purpose of positively impacting tourism in the City of Goldendale. Pursuant to RCW 67.28.1817, funding and specific awards are dependent on recommendations of the Event Committee and final decision by the City Council. The City Council may allocate all, none, or a portion of the available funds.

The Event Committee is accepting proposals for tourism related services to be provided during the 2024 calendar year and funded by revenue from the City's lodging tax. Lodging taxes available for 2024 are estimated to be \$50,000. Selected proposals will be based on their emphasis and ability to create events and activities that will result in positive user impacts on lodging, restaurants, and retail markets in the City of Goldendale.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The lodging tax is an existing (sales tax) authorized by Washington State law in RCW 67.28, Public Stadium, Convention, Arts and Tourism Facilities. The City of Goldendale receives revenue from the Washington State Revenue Department under a special Hotel-Motel Tax. The tax is a charge placed on consumers for lodging at hotels, motels, rooming houses, private campgrounds, recreational vehicle parks, and similar facilities for continuous periods of less than one month.

Funding for this program comes from the City of Goldendale Tourism Fund which receives hotel/motel taxes from lodging establishments from inside the city limits. The city collects a four percent tax on charges for overnight lodging 2% is considered a basic hotel/motel tax and the second 2% is a credit against the sales tax that lodging establishments collect.

The City of Goldendale considers lodging tax funded proposals from public agencies and <u>non-profit</u> <u>organizations</u>. Proposals must completely address the questions in the application, and all requested supplemental information must be provided.

EVENT COMMITTEE ALLOCATION EVALUATION CRITERIA

The criteria listed below constitute the standards by which applications for funding from the Lodging Tax Fund are judged. In some cases, by their nature, some applicant events, activities, programs, organizations and facilities will not be able to meet all criteria. However, the more criteria met the stronger the application.

Community Economic Impact

Potential positive economic impact of tourism on the community is a significant benefit that can be measured. In its most fundamental effect, tourism impacts the community's economy through the dollars brought to and spent in the City of Goldendale. Overnight stays generate more revenue than day visits.

The total impact can be measured in terms of direct dollar expenditures made by the visitors themselves and indirect dollar expenditures made as the money moves through the community. In evaluating applications in this area, more weight will be given to direct expenditures as they are more readily measurable.

In assessing the probable economic impact of the proposal, the Committee will consider: (a) The estimated number of visits to be generated; (b) The estimated number of overnight stays to be generated; (c) The duration of the event, activity or program; (d) The event's generation of economic activity during off-peak tourism seasons or periods; (e) The use of local firms and resources in the proposed event, activity, program or facility; and (f) New or first time events or activities.

Resources Available for Event or Facility

The applicant should identify other community capital and/or labor sources to ensure project success. Each year applications submitted for funding proposal is not guaranteed for subsequent years.

Providing seed money that will help establish the activity, program, event, organization, or facility which will later function successfully on its own are preferred.

Builds on Identified Community Assets

Community assets include natural amenities, facilities, festivals, events and activities that distinguish the City of Goldendale in the region, state and nation. Those things both help constitute and promote the County's positive image.

Meets Community Objectives

Events, projects, activities, and facilities that also serve the broader community will be given preference. The Committee will assess whether the proposal furthers the success of and coordinates with scheduled community events, facilities, and community promotion and marketing efforts.

Meets the Requirements of the Lodging Tax Law RCW 67.28.080 & 67.28.1815

Information on the requirements can be found on the Washington State Legislature website at: http://apps.leg.wa.gov/rcw/Committee will only consider proposals meeting statutory requirements.

ADDITIONAL GUIDELINES & REQUIREMENTS

Eligibility

Each applicant will concisely define the project or event to be pursued and demonstrate how it will do so. The project or event must be in compliance with Washington State statutes and the City of Goldendale guidelines established in this program.

Project Description and Scope of Work

The applicant will submit a scope of work that describes the project in detail.

Promotion Plan

If applicable, the proposal will include a detailed description of the plan to advertise, publicize and distribute information related to the project.

Schedule/Timeline

The scope of work will include a timeline indicating when each element will be undertaken and completed. Projects are expected to be completed during the funding year. It is within the City Council's discretion to revoke the funding if funds are not expended within the funding year without proper explanation.

Budget

The project will include both income and expense categories; all income (including in-kind) will be broken out by amount, source and eligible expenses will be itemized.

Insurance

As part of its contract for performance, the City requires contractors to maintain liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate coverage.

Where automobiles are used in conjunction with the performance of this agreement, throughout the life of this Agreement the Contractor and its Subcontractors shall, at their own expense, maintain automobile liability insurance with a carrier licensed to do business in the state of Washington and with minimum coverage as follows: Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability Insurance, \$1,000,000 each occurrence or combined single limit coverage of \$1,000,000.

General Liability insurance and, if applicable, automobile liability insurance coverage shall be provided under a comprehensive general and automotive liability form of insurance, such as is usual to the practice of the insurance industry, including, but not limited to all usual coverage referred to as Personal Injury including coverage A, B, and C. If applicable, automobile liability insurance shall include coverage for owned, non-owned, leased or hired vehicles.

The City of Goldendale shall be named as an additional insured on all policies except automobile insurance and all such insurance as is carried by the Contractor shall be primary over any insurance carried by the City of Goldendale. The Contractor shall provide a certificate of insurance.

Reimbursement

The City intends to enter into cost reimbursement contracts.

Reporting

When the project is complete, applicants will complete and return a *Final Event/Project Report* with original receipts and documentation for reimbursement. State law, under RCW 67.28.1816, requires that local jurisdictions receiving Lodging Tax revenues must submit an annual economic impact report.

Selection Process

After applications are submitted to the Event Committee, they will be reviewed and evaluated by committee members and staff for eligibility, quality of proposal, and consideration of the project/event. Applicants may be contacted to provide clarification, make corrections or supply additional information. Applications that do not meet the guidelines will be disqualified and returned.

Applicants may be requested to attend a meeting of the Event Committee or City Council. They will be notified of the date, time and meeting location.

Applicable Definitions from RCW 67.28.080

- (6) "Tourism promotion" means activities and expenditures designed to increase tourism, including but not limited to advertising, publicizing, or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting and welcoming tourists; developing strategies to expand tourism; operating tourism promotion agencies; and funding marketing of special events and festivals designed to attract tourists.
- (7) "Tourism-related facility" means real or tangible personal property with a usable life of three or more years, or constructed with volunteer labor, and used to support tourism, performing arts, or to accommodate tourist activities.
- (8) "Tourist" means a person who travels from a place of residence to a different town, city, county, state, or country, for purposes of business, pleasure, recreation, education, arts, heritage, or culture.

We, the undersigned, of the age of eighteen years or more, acting as incorporators for the purpose of creating a nonprofit corporation under the provisions of the Washington Non-Profit Corporation Act (Revised Code of Washington 24.03).

ARTICLE I - NAME

which the director is not legally entitled. If the Laws of the State of Washington are hereafter amended to authorize corporate action further eliminating or limiting the personal liability of directors, then the liability of a director shall be eliminated or limited to the full extent permitted by the Washington Law, as so amended. Right of Claimant to Bring Suit. If a claim under Section A of this Article is not paid in full by the corporation within sixty (60) days after a written claim has been received by the corporation, except in the case of a claim for expenses incurred in defending a proceeding in advance of its final disposition, in which case the applicable period shall be twenty (20) days, the claimant may at any time thereafter bring suit against the corporation to recover the unpaid amount of the claim and, to the extent successful in whole or in part, the claimant shall be entitled to be paid also the expense of prosecuting such claim. 

2024 LODGING TAX FUNDS GENERAL INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS

The City of Goldendale has established the Event Committee to support tourism promotion projects within the City of Goldendale. The purpose is to provide funding to eligible organizations or groups for the purpose of positively impacting tourism in the City of Goldendale. Pursuant to RCW 67.28.1817, funding and specific awards are dependent on recommendations of the Event Committee and final decision by the City Council. The City Council may allocate all, none, or a portion of the available funds.

The Event Committee is accepting proposals for tourism related services to be provided during the 2024 calendar year and funded by revenue from the City's lodging tax. Lodging taxes available for 2024 are estimated to be \$50,000. Selected proposals will be based on their emphasis and ability to create events and activities that will result in positive user impacts on lodging, restaurants, and retail markets in the City of Goldendale.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The lodging tax is an existing (sales tax) authorized by Washington State law in RCW 67.28, Public Stadium, Convention, Arts and Tourism Facilities. The City of Goldendale receives revenue from the Washington State Revenue Department under a special Hotel-Motel Tax. The tax is a charge placed on consumers for lodging at hotels, motels, rooming houses, private campgrounds, recreational vehicle parks, and similar facilities for continuous periods of less than one month.

Funding for this program comes from the City of Goldendale Tourism Fund which receives hotel/motel taxes from lodging establishments from inside the city limits. The city collects a four percent tax on charges for overnight lodging 2% is considered a basic hotel/motel tax and the second 2% is a credit against the sales tax that lodging establishments collect.

The City of Goldendale considers lodging tax funded proposals from public agencies and <u>non-profit</u> <u>organizations</u>. Proposals must completely address the questions in the application, and all requested supplemental information must be provided.

EVENT COMMITTEE ALLOCATION EVALUATION CRITERIA

The criteria listed below constitute the standards by which applications for funding from the Lodging Tax Fund are judged. In some cases, by their nature, some applicant events, activities, programs, organizations and facilities will not be able to meet all criteria. However, the more criteria met the stronger the application.

Community Economic Impact

Potential positive economic impact of tourism on the community is a significant benefit that can be measured. In its most fundamental effect, tourism impacts the community's economy through the dollars brought to and spent in the City of Goldendale. Overnight stays generate more revenue than day visits.

The total impact can be measured in terms of direct dollar expenditures made by the visitors themselves and indirect dollar expenditures made as the money moves through the community. In evaluating applications in this area, more weight will be given to direct expenditures as they are more readily measurable.

In assessing the probable economic impact of the proposal, the Committee will consider: (a) The estimated number of visits to be generated; (b) The estimated number of overnight stays to be generated; (c) The duration of the event, activity or program; (d) The event's generation of economic activity during off-peak tourism seasons or periods; (e) The use of local firms and resources in the proposed event, activity, program or facility; and (f) New or first time events or activities.

Resources Available for Event or Facility

The applicant should identify other community capital and/or labor sources to ensure project success. Each year applications submitted for funding proposal is not guaranteed for subsequent years.

Providing seed money that will help establish the activity, program, event, organization, or facility which will later function successfully on its own are preferred.

Builds on Identified Community Assets

Community assets include natural amenities, facilities, festivals, events and activities that distinguish the City of Goldendale in the region, state and nation. Those things both help constitute and promote the County's positive image.

Meets Community Objectives

Events, projects, activities, and facilities that also serve the broader community will be given preference. The Committee will assess whether the proposal furthers the success of and coordinates with scheduled community events, facilities, and community promotion and marketing efforts.

Meets the Requirements of the Lodging Tax Law RCW 67.28.080 & 67.28.1815

Information on the requirements can be found on the Washington State Legislature website at: http://apps.leg.wa.gov/rcw/Committee will only consider proposals meeting statutory requirements.

ADDITIONAL GUIDELINES & REQUIREMENTS

Eligibility

Each applicant will concisely define the project or event to be pursued and demonstrate how it will do so. The project or event must be in compliance with Washington State statutes and the City of Goldendale guidelines established in this program.

Project Description and Scope of Work

The applicant will submit a scope of work that describes the project in detail.

Promotion Plan

If applicable, the proposal will include a detailed description of the plan to advertise, publicize and distribute information related to the project.

Schedule/Timeline

The scope of work will include a timeline indicating when each element will be undertaken and completed. Projects are expected to be completed during the funding year. It is within the City Council's discretion to revoke the funding if funds are not expended within the funding year without proper explanation.

Budget

The project will include both income and expense categories; all income (including in-kind) will be broken out by amount, source and eligible expenses will be itemized.

Insurance

As part of its contract for performance, the City requires contractors to maintain liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate coverage.

Where automobiles are used in conjunction with the performance of this agreement, throughout the life of this Agreement the Contractor and its Subcontractors shall, at their own expense, maintain automobile liability insurance with a carrier licensed to do business in the state of Washington and with minimum coverage as follows: Bodily Injury Liability and Property Damage Liability Insurance, \$1,000,000 each occurrence or combined single limit coverage of \$1,000,000.

General Liability insurance and, if applicable, automobile liability insurance coverage shall be provided under a comprehensive general and automotive liability form of insurance, such as is usual to the practice of the insurance industry, including, but not limited to all usual coverage referred to as Personal Injury including coverage A, B, and C. If applicable, automobile liability insurance shall include coverage for owned, non-owned, leased or hired vehicles.

The City of Goldendale shall be named as an additional insured on all policies except automobile insurance and all such insurance as is carried by the Contractor shall be primary over any insurance carried by the City of Goldendale. The Contractor shall provide a certificate of insurance.

Reimbursement

The City intends to enter into cost reimbursement contracts.

Reporting

When the project is complete, applicants will complete and return a Final Event/Project Report with original receipts and documentation for reimbursement. State law, under RCW 67.28.1816, requires that local jurisdictions receiving Lodging Tax revenues must submit an annual economic impact report.

Selection Process

After applications are submitted to the Event Committee, they will be reviewed and evaluated by committee members and staff for eligibility, quality of proposal, and consideration of the project/event. Applicants may be contacted to provide clarification, make corrections or supply additional information. Applications that do not meet the guidelines will be disqualified and returned.

Applicants may be requested to attend a meeting of the Event Committee or City Council. They will be notified of the date, time and meeting location.

Applicable Definitions from RCW 67.28.080

- (1) "Acquisition" includes, but is not limited to, siting, acquisition, design, construction, refurbishing, expansion, repair, and improvement, including paying or securing the payment of all or any portion of general obligation bonds, leases, revenue bonds, or other obligations issued or incurred for such purpose or purposes under this chapter.
- (2) "Municipality" means any county, city or town of the state of Washington.

- (3) "Operation" includes, but is not limited to, operation, management, and marketing.
- (4) "Person" means the federal government or any agency thereof, the state or any agency, subdivision, taxing district or municipal corporations thereof other than county, city or town, any private corporation, partnership, association, or individual.
- (5) "Tourism" means economic activity resulting from tourists, which may include sales of overnight lodging, meals, tours, gifts, or souvenirs.
- (6) "Tourism promotion" means activities and expenditures designed to increase tourism, including but not limited to advertising, publicizing, or otherwise distributing information for the purpose of attracting and welcoming tourists; developing strategies to expand tourism; operating tourism promotion agencies; and funding marketing of special events and festivals designed to attract tourists.
- (7) "Tourism-related facility" means real or tangible personal property with a usable life of three or more years, or constructed with volunteer labor, and used to support tourism, performing arts, or to accommodate tourist activities.
- (8) "Tourist" means a person who travels from a place of residence to a different town, city, county, state, or country, for purposes of business, pleasure, recreation, education, arts, heritage, or culture.

The determination of whether to fund a particular project or program will be based upon a number of factors, including, but not limited to, the ability of the program or project to promote tourism in the City of Goldendale, the relative merits of the project or program compared to other applications, and the overall availability of funding. The City is the sole judge of its obligation to fund any particular project or program regardless of its merits under these factors

- The central goal of the Chamber with respect to tourism will be to contribute to the local economy by attracting increased tourist spending with area merchants, restaurants, motels, RV parks and campgrounds with the related job retention and expansion effects. The Observatory is likely to provide the largest boost to overnight stays from a community resource, with 45,000 visitors annually (2022 State Parks statistics). The City-Chamber-Observatory partnership is well positioned to get maximum local benefit for all participants.

In addition to maintaining the Visitor Information Center, event calendar, and web-based area tourism marketing, the focus in 2024 will see the Chamber continuing to coordinate with business and organizations through marketing support, and continuing its work to revitalize the City of Goldendale through the Art at the Heart of Goldendale while initiating the formation of a Creative District (upon approval from the city and WA State Arts Commission) within the city that will attract tourists and enhance livability within the city. Activities proposed for 2024 are:

- Provide marketing support to interested local and other organizations (for example, the Goldendale Observatory and Oregon Trail Rally, Bluegrass Festival)
- Plan, market and execute Goldendale Community Days (July)
- Coordinate with Washington State Parks, new Parks 501c3, and local merchants to grow the region-wide focus on the Goldendale Observatory.
- Expand the Home & Garden Show in May of 2024 by redirecting the focus back to Home & Garden
 based exhibitors and vendors. Return the show as a three-day event. Increase the offering of the show
 with interactive workshops, multiple live speakers, and a beef cook off to showcase our agricultural
 community to attract visitors from outside the Goldendale area + 50 miles
- Build off of the 2023 Goldendale Art Festival to increase offering to attendees by bringing in more fine
 art, art-based activities and performances, thus attracting visitors from 50+ miles away and increasing
 lodging stays.
- Assist ABATE in administering, managing, and marketing an Independence Day event at the Klickitat County Fairgrounds: with a demolition derby and fireworks to entice tourists to stay in Goldendale throughout the weekend of July 7-8 for Community Days.
- Collaborate with the City of Goldendale to explore and contribute to signage and wayfinding effort within the city to guide visitors to downtown businesses, Art Installations, and the Goldendale Observatory.
- Continue to assist local retailers, restaurants, and lodging establishments for a coordinated presence on goldendalechamber.org, social media platforms, email marketing, Google Business, radio, and newspapers.
- Continue support of other non-profit groups through copier and insurance services, and in-house marketing.
- Develop and promote various 'micro-programs' to encourage visitors and community members to shop locally.
- Continue to promote and provide a venue space at no cost to the Goldendale Farmers Market from May to October

 - In addition to being a point of contact for Visitors, the Chamber's location and hours of operation serve as a great resource to those in the community.  - a. Home & Garden Show Estimated 3,500
 - b. Goldendale Community Days Estimated 3,000

- While the Visitor Information Center provides a hub for Chamber-provided assistance, as mentioned previously, the Observatory is likely to provide the largest boost to overnight stays.

Along with muilti-day events such as the Home and Garden show and single events including Goldendale Community Days and Goldendale Art Festival will contribute to an increase in spending at city restaurants, bars, and retail as well as overnight stays.

The Chamber website business directory contributes to ease of locating city businesses and attractions like the Observatory, Parks, Goldendale Reindeer, and ongoing Art at the Heart of Goldendale public art project, thus elevating Goldendale's profile in The Gorge. Additionally, marketing efforts by the Chamber's in-house marketing team through email, social media and co-advertising with local businesses assist in highlighting Goldendale attractions and businesses.

Will this project/event/Visitor Information Center have a broad-based community benefit or appeal? (Approximately 35 words or less)

Throughout 2023 the Chamber has been able to maintain multiple staff members at increased hours.

- The Chamber office is open for business 5 days a week in the winter and 6 days a week in the summer keeping regular hours, and staffed by the Executive Director, Administrative Assistant, and several trained volunteers. In the Spring of 2024, The Chamber will increase its hours to 9am to 4pm Monday through Friday, Saturdays will return with the Goldendale Farmer's Market from 7am to 2pm.
- The Chamber staff coordinates with city restaurants, bars (including American Legion), to alert them to events such as the Oregon Trail Rally, so they can provide longer hours of operation and live music thus improving the visitor experience while increasing spend during these events.
- The Chamber is a robust hub for community Information with a comprehensive business directory with a tourism focus and events calendar on the Chamber website.
- Over 50 local artists exhibit and sell their work at the Chamber gallery which is contributing to a burgeoning art community that has expanded the interest in face-to-face visits to the Visitor Information Center.
- Is a source of local service provider information.
- Chamber-managed events, support for events initiated by other organizations, and the
 Observatory liaisons are intended to further attract spending to local merchants.
 The Chamber also publishes information for many local events. Such as Goldendale Home &
 Garden Show, Goldendale Community Days, Art Festival, Rodeos and more. In 2023 the
 Chamber staff promoted 228 events as of November 15th, 2023, via the chamber's online
 events calendar. That is a 66% increase compared to 2022.





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
